What is the Open Government Partnership (OGP)?

A multi-stakeholder initiative through which governments make concrete commitments to open government.



What is "open government?"

A government where people:

- Have access to information about the decisions that interest them.
- Can participate in decisionmaking at all levels.
- Can hold officials accountable for decisions and actions.
- Use **technology** to promote the above values.

Brief History of OGP

- 2011: OGP launched by 8 founding countries: Brazil, Indonesia, Mexico, Norway, the Philippines, South Africa, the United Kingdom and the United States.
- 2012-2015: OGP expands rapidly to include 6 9 participating countries and thousands of civil society organizations.

 2015: 50 OGP countries commit to using O G P national action plans as one means to implement the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Letter of Intention to Join the Open Government Partnership (OGP)

I am honoured to submit this letter of intent to the Open Government Partnership Steering Committee on behalf of the Government of Nigeria and to express Nigeria's commitment to join the Partnership.

As you are aware, Nigeria meets the eligibility criteria set out by the OGP and the government of Nigeria is strongly committed to the principles of Open Government. By joining OGP, the government of Nigeria commits to transparency and accountability in the management of public office. We believe that the OGP membership will enhance innovation, economic development and accelerate the transformation of our public service.

It is important to note that Nigeria is already participating actively in the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) process and implementing the EITI Standards. Nigeria has also enacted the Public Procurement Act and the Fiscal Responsibility Act with a view to enhancing transparency in public contracting, public procurement as well as the management of public finance. Nigeria has also improved access to information through the enactment of the Freedom of Information Act and the Code of Conduct Bureau Act. The requirement for the disclosure of assets by public officials is embedded in the Constitution and all public officers are required to declare their assets every four years.

Against this background, Nigeria is committed to working with you and other countries within the OGP framework to implement the OGP initiatives with major focus on accountability of government institutions, enhancing freedom of information and corporate ownership transparency, particularly in the extractive industry.

"Co-Creation" / Consultation Process


- Public/ civil society must be involved in developing and implementing National Action Plan
- Flexibility allows each country to design their own process
- But must follow basic guidelines to ensure meaningful consultation

"Co-Creation" / Consultation Process

- Keys to success:
 - Adequate notice and awareness-raising among public
 - Breadth of consultation wide array of stakeholders
 - Allowing civil society groups to self-select to participate (rather than hand-picking them)
 - Responding to inputs and feedback through iterative consultation process
- **Good practice:** Permanent multi-stakeholder dialogues (used in 36 OGP countries)
